Brief Description of the Organization

Family Connection of Easton is the non-profit family center for the Easton Area School District. We are proud to celebrate our 20th Anniversary in 2018! Our mission is to be a catalyst for change within families, schools and communities. Through a team approach that includes families, the Easton Area School District and community organizations, we improve academic performance, the quality of life, and the strength of our community. Our vision is to create a compassionate community where all children and families have the opportunity to achieve academic and personal success.

Family Connection was founded in 1998 with support from the United Way of the Greater Lehigh Valley to be the bridge between families, schools and the community. Initially, services were only offered at one elementary school, but by 2007 we were offering services throughout the district! Family Connection was incorporated and became a 501(c)(3) organization in 2006. Over the years, Family Connection of Easton has expanded its scope of services and currently offers the following programs:

- Family Support and Case Management improves family self-sufficiency and positive school involvement;
- **Parents Who Care** a family wellness and parenting education program;
- <u>Backpack Pals</u> provides 180 EASD children with tote bags of kid-friendly, nutritious food to take home over long holiday weekends as well as establish and maintain pantries at EAMS and EAHS;
- <u>Health & Wellness Initiative</u> assists families in securing free/low-cost health insurance and school-based preventative health services;
- <u>The Parent-Child Home Program</u> a nationally recognized program to prepare preschool age children and their families for a successful school start through 100 home visits over 2 years with Family Literacy Specialists, who mentor parents on how to work with their children on developmental activities;
- <u>Afterschool Learning Clubs</u> after-school programs at Paxinosa and Cheston Elementary Schools to help students strengthen reading and math skills along with enrichment and character-building activities; and
- <u>Kindergarten Connection</u> a community-wide initiative designed to engage preschools, students, parents, businesses, community service organizations, and the Easton Area School District to increase school readiness

Summary of the Proposal

Family Connection seeks support from the Easton Rotary Service Foundation for our Kindergarten Connection Program. This initiative began in 2009 and aims to engage preschools, students, parents, businesses, community service organizations and the Easton Area School District to increase school readiness. The main goals of the initiative are to create activities and align systems to ensure a seamless transition for students and families from Pre-K or home to Kindergarten. It is important to note that the programs and activities of Kindergarten Connection serve two distinct populations, each equally important in creating a successful transition program—children and teachers. We feel that we are at the forefront of transition activities in the Lehigh Valley, with new features and activities being added to the calendar each year. We know that a child's level of readiness is influenced by a number of factors, including exposure to learning opportunities, access to resources, family engagement, alignment of the Pre-K to K programs, and a welcoming environment at school. The activities of Kindergarten Connection aim to enhance all of these factors by leveling the playing field with the ultimate result that all children enter the K-12 system ready to learn.

Project Description

Statement of the need

In 2015, the Department of Education released a report stating that 6 out of 10 students are unprepared for Kindergarten. In "A Matter of Equity: Preschool in America," findings show that many children, especially those from low-income homes, are at risk for academic failure as they, "on average, start Kindergarten 12 to 14 months behind their peers in pre-literacy and language skills."

Additional research shows that stability in a child's early school settings and in the relationships with the adults in these settings, equates to improved social and academic outcomes in their school career (Curby, Rimm-Kaufman, & Ponitz, 2009; Tran & Winsler, 2011).

Family Connection's transition work began in 2009 with a needs assessment survey conducted with Pre-K educators, Kindergarten teachers and EASD administrators. The survey results led to the creation of our Transition Plan, which is now the driving document behind all efforts of the Kindergarten Connection initiative. We work to ensure that standards, curriculum, support services and assessments for Pre-K and Kindergarten align in an effort to have ready children, ready families, ready teachers, ready schools and ready communities.

How the proposal addresses the need

Kindergarten Connection develops a series of annual activities managed by our Kindergarten Connection Coordinator. The Coordinator works closely with approximately 30 local Pre-Ks and other key stakeholders to implement this initiative. In 2016-17, we saw 622 incoming Kindergarten students representing all 7 EASD elementary schools participate in at least one transition activity!

Transition activities include:

- Little Red Wagon traveling story times through select neighborhoods in Easton;
- Visits to the Easton Area Public Library to gain exposure to their services as well as to participate in story time and musical and kinesthetic activities;

- Provision of themed CD's, videos and books to Pre-Ks for year-long transition conversations;
- Promotion of on-time registration including dissemination of information at events and with community partners. "Branding" efforts include a Ready Rover mascot and t-shirts for all incoming Kindergarten students;
- Preparing and distributing "Summer Fun Bags" at Kindergarten Registration that include academic supplies and resource materials;
- Hosting Spring readiness sessions for incoming Paxinosa and Cheston students and their families to bridge the time between registration (March) and summer EASD programming. Sessions include tips and strategies for academic and social success as well as materials for use at home;
- Operating "Spring to Kindergarten" festivals at all 7 EASD elementary schools each May to welcome families, create connections and have fun;
- Preparing and distributing "Welcome Backpacks" to students on the 1st day of school;
- Hosting educational professional development forums for Kindergarten and Pre-K teachers to build relationships and share best practices; and
- Surveying of parents, administrators and teachers in an effort to assess the effectiveness of this work and provide Kindergarten teachers valuable data on transitioning students

Population to be served

Any child in EASD's catchment area can attend events. Recruitment is mainly done in partnership with Easton's many PreK centers. In an effort to find those children not in PreK, we "hit the streets" with fliers and information for businesses, bodegas, clinics, etc. and partners like the local community center, housing authority and more. Parent liaisons are recruited at elementary schools to spread the word. In addition, we promote through mailings, our website and social media. The "Reddy Rover" mascot created specifically for Kindergarten in the Easton Area School District is used on materials as our symbol of transition.

While Kindergarten Connection is a district-wide initiative, a more intense focus is largely on students entering Paxinosa and Cheston Elementary Schools. Both of these schools are classified as Title I schools for Reading and Math, meaning that they have been recognized by the Department of Education as having a significant population of low-income, high-risk students. Both schools qualify to receive daily free breakfast and lunch to 100% of their students and both have highly transient populations and truancy issues.

Goals and measurable outcomes

According to research compiled in a brief entitled, "Four Important Things to Know About the Transition to School" by the Harvard Family Research Project, "when children are part of a quality transition process, they have an easier time and enjoy improved academic achievement, more positive social and emotional competencies and fewer problem behaviors as well as rapidly developing skills. Quality transitions are those in

which families, schools, and communities have opportunities to work together as a team, to share information, and to create continuity in curriculum, assessments, and relationship quality across learning settings."

The objectives of Kindergarten Connection are to:

- Provide a variety of activities for children and their families held at EASD schools to better familiarize them with the school setting and school staff;
- Supply children in need with improved access to books and other educational materials in an effort to promote early literacy at home;
- Facilitate opportunities for joint professional development for Pre-K and Kindergarten teachers and administrators; and
- Develop methods for data sharing between parents, Pre-Ks and the EASD on a child's level of readiness

The overall goal is to align systems and implement activities based on research to improve a family's comfort level when entering school and create a network of community where all stakeholders understand that they have a role in ensuring a child's successful entry into school.

We have collected a variety of data on our transition efforts over the past several years. EASD prefers to evaluate readiness in the following ways:

- Cohort (year-to-year) review of the number of students with on-time registration;
- Cohort (year-to-year) review of incoming standardized assessment (STARS) data once they enter their Kindergarten year; and
- Developmental Checklists

Developmental Checklists are completed by both parents and Pre-K centers to measure students' capacity in the categories of Language & Communication, Cognitive Development and Social-Emotional Competency. These forms are analyzed and passed on to each student's incoming Kindergarten teacher for their use at the start of the school year. The data helps us look at overall trends in student competencies, which in turn dictates what areas of development we focus on in our transition events.

Other funding sources

Family Connection of Easton seeks support in the amount of \$5,000 from the Easton Rotary Service Foundation for our Kindergarten Connection Program. A projected Kindergarten Connection 2018-19 budget is included as an attachment to this application. Funds will be used in part to support the salary of our Kindergarten Connection Coordinator. The Coordinator is a full-year position at 32 hours/week. Job duties include management of the day-to-day program operation, establishing and maintaining relationships with Pre-K and EASD personnel, data collection and entry, volunteer management, purchasing of readiness materials and supplies, budget management and more.

Funds will also be used for program materials and supplies that are distributed to incoming Kindergarten

students and their families across EASD. Some examples of materials and supplies include flash cards, puzzles, books, math manipulatives, crayons, markers, scissors, activities to strengthen fine and gross motor skills and more! A small amount will be spent on food for our joint educators professional development series.

Funding would ideally be needed by June 2018 for use in our 2018-19 program year. We thank the Easton Rotary Service Foundation for its past support of Family Connection and hope that you once again find us worthy of consideration.
